WHY BATS MATTER

Humans need bats. Worldwide, there are more than 1,400 species of bats—that’s almost 20 percent of all mammal species. Bats live almost everywhere on Earth except the most extreme desert and polar regions. So, no matter where you live, it is almost certain that there are bats living near you. Bats are amazing animals that are vital to the health of our environment and economy. Although we may not always see them, bats are hard at work all around the world each night. Most bats in North America eat insects, including moths, beetles, aquatic insects, and flies. A single bat can eat up to its body weight in insects each night. Eating all these insects helps protect our food crops and forests from insect pests, saving farmers and forest managers billions of dollars each year.

Consider these fascinating bat facts:

Bats come in all shapes and sizes, from the tiny, adorable bumblebee bat that weighs less than a penny to the big, beautiful flying foxes that can have a wingspan of up to six feet.

Bats are the only mammal that can truly fly (although some other mammals “glide”). A bat’s wing is actually a modified hand—similar to yours.

Contrary to popular belief, bats actually have good eyesight (similar to that of humans), but for most species, their main technique for navigating or locating prey is using echolocation (not all species echolocate!): emitting very high-pitched sounds that bounce off obstacles in their path, like trees, other bats, buildings, and food. main target—delicious insects. Not all bats that echolocate are insectivores!

Bats eat lots of different things. Although almost 70% of bat species feed primarily on insects, some bats are carnivorous, eating meat like rodents, frogs, and fish. Only three species of bats feed on animal blood, with two of these species specializing on bird blood. Many other bats eat pollen, nectar or fruit—these bats are vital for pollinating flowers and spreading seeds that grow new plants and trees.

During the month of October 2024, the Laguna Vista Police Department conducted a total of fifty-two traffic stops. Officers issued nineteen warning citations. Additionally, officers issued thirty-three citations to appear before the Municipal Court Judge reference to the traffic violations. Furthermore, officers responded to one hundred and two calls for police service.

During this month officers investigated the following:

Five assaults, One aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.
Officers are investigating two questionable death investigations.
Officers responded to twenty-four medical calls.
Officers conducted fourteen ordinance violations.
Officers responded to and conducted three traffic accident investigation.
Officers responded to three domestic violence issues.
Officers dealt with a subject who resisted arrest and minimum amount of force was use.

Significant Events:

- *One new vehicle for the police department has arrived and we are expecting two more vehicles to arrive this week.
- * One new officer was hired and is in training.
- * There will be an increase in patrol due to the holiday season upon us.
- * LVPD has two continuous ongoing investigations.

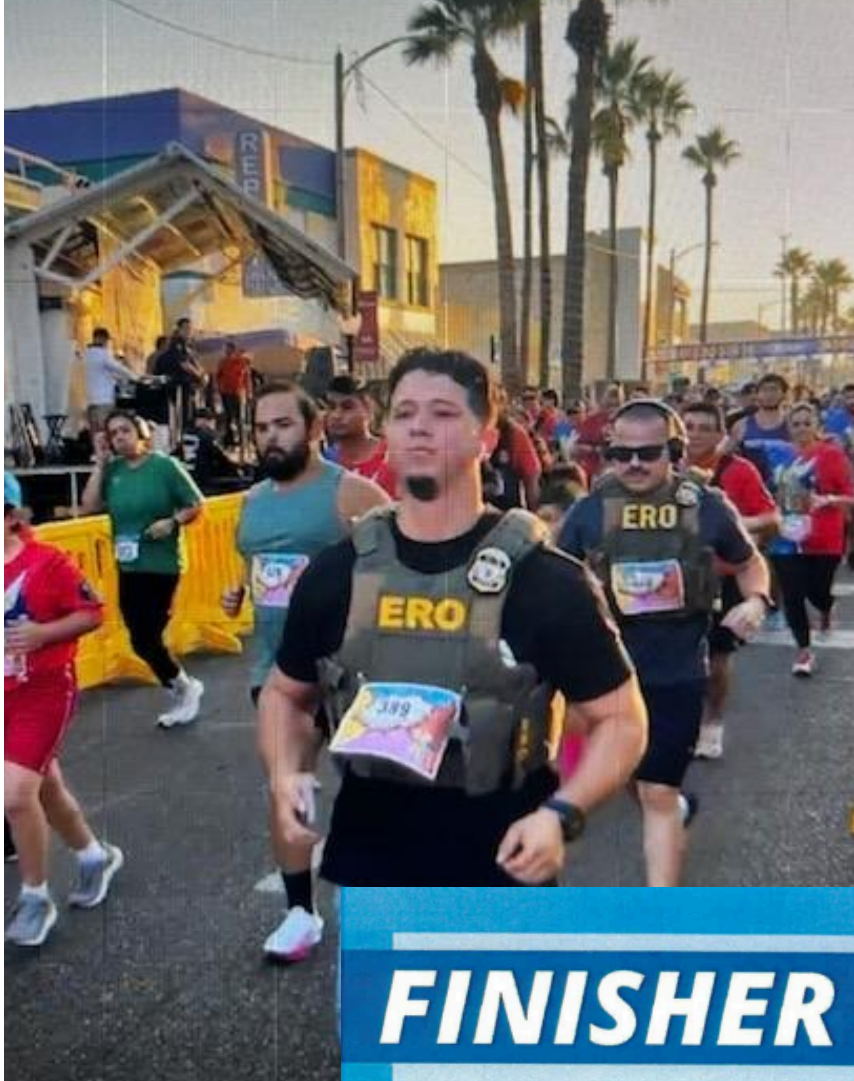

LVFD October Report

Service Calls

The month of October was a busy one! The Laguna Vista Volunteer Fire Dept. responded to a total of forty (40) calls for service, putting us at 349 calls for the calendar year. Thirty-Four EMS calls and six (6) Fire calls (Fire is anything other than EMS). The Fire calls consisted of two (2) Dispatched & Cancelled en route, one (1) motor vehicle accident with no injuries, one (1) motor vehicle accident with injuries, and two (2) Fires.

Station Improvements

The laundry room was completed by RC Construction. Prior to this project the washer and dryer were in the kitchen area. Upon completion the washer and dryer are out of sight and out of mind, they are located in what was previously used as an EMS supply storage room. Also in process is the engineering of the building extension to be added to the north side of the existing station. Upon completion of the engineered plans the bidding process will open up, followed by construction.

New Software System

By no choice of our own we are changing our incident reporting software. ESO bought out Emergency Reporting System (ERS) (our current software) and we will be switching over to their platform soon. ERS will no longer support the necessary reporting capabilities for the NERIS (National Emergency Response Information System) system, which is replacing the NFIRS (National Fire Incident Reporting System) system (federal). We will also be changing over from "Active911" to "I Am Responding".

Listed below are a few of the benefits:

- Google mapping to the scene.
- Satellite imaging of the exact location of the caller. (not just the address)
- The ability to share pre-fire plans with neighboring jurisdictions (shares both ways), jurisdictions must give consent.
- The ability to share hydrant locations (Google Mapping) with neighboring jurisdictions (with consent).
- No limit on subscriptions.
- Mutual Aid response status.
- Recorded alerts, available for playback at any time.



Community



October is also a busy time of the year for events. This month fire department members went to several events in Laguna Vista, Laguna Heights and Port Isabel to spread the word and bring smiles to children's faces!! On October the 9th LVVFD went to Beacon Bay's Daycare Center to help educate young children on fire safety. Then, on October 18th the FD was at the Town of Laguna Vista Fall Festival (my favorite) helping out with EMS needs and trying to solicit a few new FD members! On October 25th we all met here at the station for the annual First Responder Appreciation Dinner. I can't express enough how grateful I am that Mrs. Gonzalez takes the time to show her appreciation for the time and effort the LVVFD members sacrifice for their community. On October the 26th we were at the Port Isabel Lighthouse for Spooktacular !! What an evening that was! On October the 30th crews showed up at the Golf Course cart barn for the Golf Course Halloween event. All of the events went very well and were a lot of fun for the guys (and gals) of the fire department.





Safety Tip of the Month



Ladder Safety

As the cool weather becomes more frequent home projects become more frequent as well, no one wants to do these home projects in 100 plus degree weather! Some of these projects involve the use of ladders, whether they are A-Frame ladders, extension ladders, step ladders or even those fancy Little Giant ladders, they are all ladders and deserve to be respected. So here are a few (lots of) words regarding ladder safety brought to you by LadderFeed.

1. Ensure ladder inspection requirements The first thing to do before using a ladder is to inspect for any red flags. You need to check for cracks and splits, rust, corrosion, and bolts that are not in place. Also, check that the rungs are correctly secured to both sides of the ladder. All locks and hinges should be functioning seamlessly before using the ladder. Any damage, no matter how small, is an indication of an unsafe ladder. You should only use the ladder if all the safety requirements are met. Ladder rung spacing is also a matter that requires attention. If you are not comfortable with the rung spacing then avoid using that ladder, it's risky.
2. Maintain 4 rules for ladder safety The ladder should maintain a 75-degree angle from the wall. You may know this as the 4:1 ratio or 4 rules for ladder safety. What does this mean? If your ladder is going to be 12 feet high, the distance of the base from the wall should be three feet. You can measure this by standing straight with your toes at the bottom of the ladder. When you stretch out your arms, they should rest on the rungs at your shoulder height without overreaching. We recommend this to maintain ideal ladder angle.
3. Maintain the 3-point rules when climbing Always climb the ladder with two hands and one foot on the ladder or two feet and one hand in contact with the ladder. Maintaining contact with the ladder will help you remain steady. Also, keep your weight centered between the rails to avoid toppling over.
4. Extend the ladder over the roof If you are planning to clean your gutters or fix the roof using an extension ladder, ensure that the ladder is extended over the roof. Ensure that you extend the ladder at least one meter over the roof. If you are going to climb onto the roof from the ladder, climb from the second-highest rung and not the top rung. Extension ladders are more likely to lead to an accident, so while using an extension ladder you must follow extension ladder safety tips.
5. Keep the ladder on a stable footing Although some ladders come with rubber feet to prevent slipping, it's still essential to ensure you are working on a firm footing. It's even more critical when you are working on unstable or uneven ground, such as a muddy or sloppy ground. Set the ladder's feet on a non-slip carpet or plywood board staked to the ground for stability. You can also secure the ladder using unique ladder straps for additional stability or get someone to hold the ladder in place as you use it. Learn more about how to secure a ladder for highest level of safety.
6. Cover the top ends of the ladder If you are using an extension ladder to access high walls, remember that it can slide against the wall or siding its placed on. You can tie some old socks or rugs on either side of the ladder to prevent skidding. You can also purchase some rubber covers to put over the ends. Remember that you should never lean your ladder against doors, windows, or any unstable surfaces. Learn more about safe use of ladders.



7. Use rubber shoes when climbing a ladder Although some ladders come with non-skid rungs, it's essential to wear rubber shoes for precaution. The rubber shoes add traction to the ladder and keep you from slipping when climbing or using. Ensure that the boots have deep treads for maximum stability. Do not climb a ladder barefoot, with high heels or improper shoes.

8. Avoid overreaching Overreaching has got to be the biggest sin in using ladders. Do not use the top three rungs of a ladder unless they are designed for use. It does not matter whether you are using an extension ladder, step ladder or an a-frame. The top rungs of the ladder can lead to accidents due to loss of balance. It's also very risky to improvise using boxes and blocks of wood to create extra height on the ladder. These items can collapse and lead to falls. What we've found during our research is really scary, people try to overreach the heights using a tiny step ladder which is very dangerous, so we want to motivate you to follow step ladder safety tips while using one. But if you really need to get access of top corners of your home or workplace then you need the proper ladder. We have also published a resourceful handy reviews of the 9 best indoor ladder for high places, don't forget to check that out.

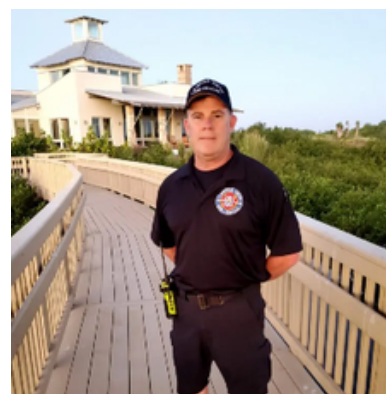
9. Do not exceed the maximum load rating of the ladder Every ladder comes with a weight rating that determines how much weight the ladder can withstand before collapsing. You need to ensure that your ladder can hold both your weight and the work load, if any. Using a ladder that cannot withstand your weight could cause the ladder to break and cause an accident. Even if you are a feather-weight, a type I (heavy duty) or type ii (medium-duty) ladder is recommended. Avoid light duty ladders at all costs.

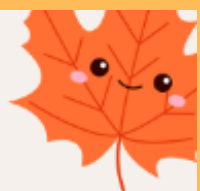
10. Be informed about the weather before using a ladder It's dangerous to work on a windy or rainy day on the ladder since it causes ladder instability. Severe heat or cold also makes it uncomfortable and hazardous to work on a ladder. Therefore, you need to watch weather forecast before setting a ladder date. A dry, mild, and windless day is ideal for repairing your roof or cleaning the gutters using a ladder. Using a ladder on the soft, muddy, or icy ground can expose the user to extreme danger. It's also advisable to follow portable ladder safety guides while using one because portable ladders are a bit more fragile than others.

11. Store the ladder in a safe place – it's a part of ladder safety The ladder, whether made of wood, aluminum, or stainless steel, should be stored in a dry place to avoid rusting, corrosion, or any damage. The ladder should be repaired, cleaned, and let to dry appropriately before storage. It's also essential to keep the ladder in a lockable garage as burglars can use it to access your house.

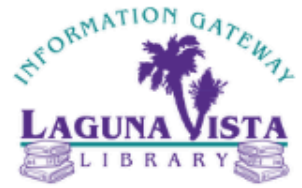

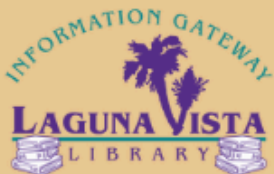

Recycling Program Laguna Vista Proof of Residency

If you live and/or own property in Laguna Vista, you are eligible to use our weekly recycling services.

A recycling truck is available every Saturday at Roloff Park from 8:00am – 12:00pm (or whenever the truck gets full – so we suggest coming early).

Beginning **November 1, 2024** only vehicles with a proof of residency sticker will be permitted to drop off their recycling at the Laguna Vista recycle location.

Two (2) stickers will be provided per household/business.

Proof of Residency forms can be obtained from our website (**HERE**) or at City Hall. You will need the following items to complete the form:

RESIDENT/LOCAL BUSINESS:

- 1) Drivers License/Passport (cannot be expired);
- 2) A current utility bill or copy of rental lease as proof of residency; and
- 3) License plate number, make, model and color of each vehicle.

Proof of Residency Stickers will be issued within 7 days of form submission.

There is no cost for the stickers; however, as noted above, without the sticker you will NOT be permitted to drop off your recycling **AFTER** November 1, 2024.
